Dr. Jose Picart, Vice Provost for Academic Programs and Services (NC State, Raleigh, NC), Executive Director of Raleigh Colleges and Community Collaborative **Sunday, March 3—4:45 pm - 6:00 pm (Carolina Ballroom)**



Dr. Jose Picart serves as the Vice Provost for Academic Programs and Services at North Carolina State University. In this capacity he leads twelve campus units that promote and enhance student retention and academic success including Academic Advising, the First Year College, the Undergraduate Tutorial Center, the Honors and Scholars Program, the Office of Undergraduate Research and several others. He also serves as a Professor of Counselor Education in the College of Education and as the Executive Director of the Raleigh Promise. Dr. Jose Picart is a native of San Juan, Puerto Rico and he completed his undergraduate degree at the United States Military Academy at West Point, where he majored in Engineering and Humanities. Following his graduation from West Point, Dr. Picart served his country as a commissioned military officer for 28 years rising

through various command and staff positions to the rank of Colonel. He earned his Master of Science and Doctoral degree in Experimental Cognitive Psychology from the University of Oklahoma in Norman. Title: What Drives Student Satisfaction?

The process and outcomes of a regression study on a private university's 2011 College Senior Survey (CSS) results are described. The dependent variable, "If you could make your college choice over, would you still choose to enroll at your current college?" is statistically correlated with 21 satisfaction items of the survey as independent variables. Examples include satisfaction with social life, career planning, study abroad, and advising in conducting the enlightening study. Outcomes will show that satisfaction with certain activities is most important for the overall "happiness" of graduating seniors. Additionally, significant difference studies on various demographic groups will be described.

Title: Determining Factors that Affect Student Retention:

A comparison of students with close friends that will attend the same institution

Presenter: Mondrail Myrick, Fayetteville State University Facilitator: Amyn Abduk-Kaliq, Fayetteville State University

The purpose of this research is to identify and compare factors related to retention among first year students. This research will examine first year students who have close friends that will attend the same institution and first year students who do not have close friends that will attend the same institution. Historical data were collected from the Beginning College Survey of Student Engagement (BCSSE) and The Student Data File. Exploratory factor analysis and binary logistic regressions were used to determine the factors of retention. Hypothesized casual models were estimated using Linear Structural Relations (LISREL). Students with close friends were more likely to be retained and had different significant factors than students without close friends that will attend the same institution.

Two years later, after initial faculty resistance, the SLO process has evolved as a new mechanism to help faculty improve student learning. 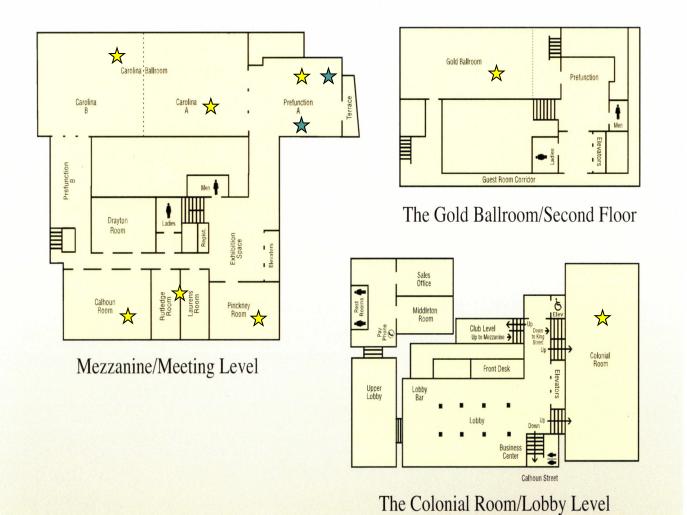

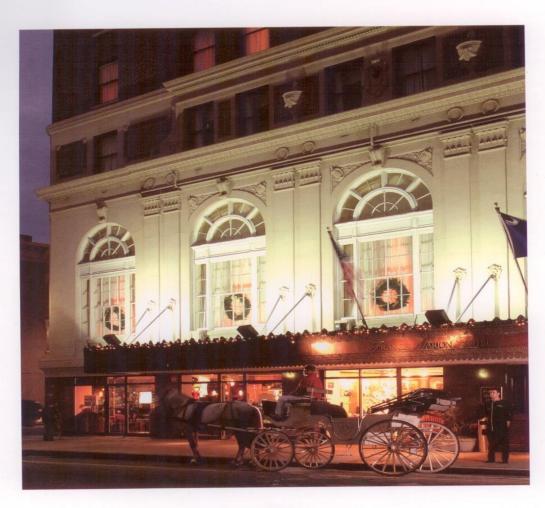
Francis Marion Hotel - Floor Plan
